



Maryland's "Red Flag Law"

While most of us were focused on the upcoming election, there was a tragic story unfolding on Monday in Ferndale, Maryland, a suburb to the south of Baltimore. Maryland has enacted a new "red flag" law which allows people to call in reports of gun owners who are acting erratically and may present a danger to themselves or others. Under this new law, that gives the police the right to show up and confiscate their firearms. (The law has only been in effect for a month.) That's what happened to 61-year-old Gary J. Willis.

According to police, two officers serving a new Extreme Risk Protective Order (Red Flag Law), a Maryland protective order to remove guns from a household, shot and killed the man listed on that order

That man was identified as Gary J. Willis of same address.

Officials said Willis answered the door while holding a handgun. Willis then placed the gun next to the door. When officers began to serve him the order, Willis became irate and grabbed his gun.

One of the officers tried to take the gun from Willis, but instead, Willis fired the gun. The second officer fired a gun, striking Willis. He died at the scene.

This is a horrible story and assigning blame here may not wind up involving either the officers or Willis himself, or at least not entirely. First of all, when the police show up at your house, answering the door with a gun in your hand is just about the worst choice you can make. The officers, who were later identified as Cpl. Jessica Hooper and Officer Gary Zawodny, are going to immediately be on edge, which is never good. Willis may have set aside his weapon briefly, but as outrageous as a gun confiscation order would be to any lawful owner of firearms, picking up the gun again and discharging it is a sure way to get yourself killed. Neither officer was injured and both have been placed on administrative leave while the investigation moves forward as per standard policy.

So, it's tough to lay the blame on the cops here. The guy drew on them and discharged his weapon. But the real question is why they were sent to take away Mr. Willis' weapons in the first place. We don't know, and we may never know. That's because *this very dubious "red flag law" makes all requests for Extreme Risk Protective Orders confidential and they can be submitted anonymously.* Perhaps the order was submitted by a mental health professional who was treating Willis and they had justifiable reasons. Perhaps Willis had been discharging the weapon inside the home or threatening a family member.

But it's also possible that somebody was just angry with Willis or is really opposed to firearm ownership and decided to call in a claim. Let's not pretend that something like that can't or won't happen. But as I said, we don't know because the law was crafted in a way to keep us from finding out. So really, anyone can have a dime dropped on them for no reason and the police will soon be at the door to confiscate their firearms.

Granted, the fact that Willis answered the door with his handgun doesn't speak well of his safe firearm handling practices nor even common sense. But that's not the point. He could have been the safest, most responsible gun owner in the neighborhood and a disgruntled relative or unscrupulous therapist could

have made a phone call and the police would have arrived with a court order. This is a bad law, and if it's not going to be repealed it needs to be modified for more oversight.

PACA member Doug Johnson testified against HB 1302 (his testimony is well worth reading) and makes the following observations:

My testimony before the legislative committee is in the public domain. However, while accurate, some of the testimony may now a bit out of date. I intend to write something new about how the law is actually being implemented, and as time allows, I am gathering information on that subject. This is not easy: For example, I have yet to see any reliable, detailed documentation on what actually occurred in the Willis case, from family disagreement to Willis shot dead. (I am not at all certain that the Hot Air writer is accurate in saying that Willis "fir[ed] a shot in the direction of the police," or that any shot was deliberately fired from his gun --although if the newspaper accounts are accurate, he did not comply with police orders as he should have). —Doug Johnson

ADDITIONAL NOTE: On January 4, 2019, Virginia Governor Ralph Northam (D) proposed several gun control laws – among them a "Red Flag Law". Other proposals include universal background checks and reinstituting a one-handgun-per-month purchase limit. If you do not support these measures, please contact your state representative and let them know.

A Late Addition to the "Three Favorite Items from WW2" Presentation





Acquired too late to bring to the membership meeting last August when we shared our "Three Favorites of World War II" – this survival spit is interesting enough that I wanted to share it anyway. Designed to be issued with the C-1 Aircrew Survival Vest, the versatile survival spit consists of multiple parts contained in a small metal tin and a thin cardboard box (*above left, with contents shown above right*). When assembled, the roasting spit was 27 inches long. Multiple tools could be made, including a spear and a grapple (*below*). Such a kit could still be useful today in someone's "Bug Out Bag!"



Show-n-Tell

There was one show-n-tell item brought for membership examination. It was a Smith & Wesson Model No. 2 "Old Army" with an unusual back-story (above). This single action is chambered in .32 Rimfire and features extensive period engraving with ivory grips carved with the Eagle and Snake motif of the Mexican coat of arms. We were fortunate to have Mr. Jim Supica, curator of the NRA firearm museums and co-author (with our own Rick Nahas) of the book "Standard Catalog of Smith and Wesson" now in its 4th Edition - with us at the meeting, and he gave an excellent description of this fine old revolver (at left). The Number 2 began production in 1861 and though a popular sidearm during the Civil War, it was never officially purchased by the U.S. Army. Approximately 77,155 No. 2s were produced between 1861 and 1874.

What was the unusual back-story, you ask? It was discovered wrapped in an oily rag under the seat of an abandoned pickup truck and is thought to have been stored there and not touched for over two decades!

A TRIP TO THE MUSEUM: THE HUSQVARNA MUSEUM, Part I

To those familiar with Swedish small arms Husqvarna is an ancient and respected name holds a special place among Swedish gun makers. Husqvarna's weapon making tradition can be traced back to the founding of the Rumlaborg fortress in the 1300's. In 1620 the Jonkopings Gevarsfaktori (rifle factory) was founded by King Gustav II Adolf as one of five in Sweden. The factory established a drilling works for making barrels in Husqvarna in 1689 and production of firearms was gradually moved from Jonkoping to Husqvarna because the waterfall there provided more reliable power to work the machinery. In 1757 the factory was privatized and renamed Husqvarna Gevarsfaktori. When Husqvarna received new orders in 1867 to produce Remington Rolling Block rifles and carbines for the Swedish army it was changed into an incorporated company, renamed Husqvarna Vapenfabriks (weapon factory), and a new modern workshop was built. In 1877 Husqvarna started to

manufacture guns for the civilian hunting market, including double rifles and shotguns, and later bolt action rifles. Military small arms production continued and during World War 2 up to 400,000 guns, including M-38 and M-96 Mausers, M/07 Pistols (Browning 1903), M/40 Lahti pistols, and Suomi submachine guns) were manufactured. Husqvarna also made flare guns, anti-tank weapons and other munitions. The last military rifle made by Husqvarna was the AK4; the Swedish version of the H&K G3.



Both military and civilian rifle production was sold to FFV in 1970 and Carl Gustaf in Eskiltuna took over manufacturing those guns. Husqvarna continued to manufacture deluxe shotguns until 1989 and sold its shotgun service and repair shop in 1997, putting an end to 300 years of firearms manufacturing. Husqvarna is also known for the many other items it produced and sold, including sewing machines, stoves, cookware, bicycles, motorcycles, lawn mowers, outboard motors, chainsaws, and other outdoor equipment. Over the years it became a Swedish industrial powerhouse.

The Husqvarna Museum was founded in 1992 and the Museum opened its doors in 1993. The museum is

housed in the old weapon-making factory, which was donated by the company. Well over 200 Husqvarna-made firearms are on public display. On display are examples of every military weapon that Husqvarna produced, from swords, axes and pikes, to the first known matchlock musket to the flintlock, percussion and cartridge guns, to more modern AK4s, flare guns, and even anti-tank weapons. Besides the military weapons, every one of Husqvarna's civilian weapons is also on display – at least one of every model and variation. These include many custom rifles and shotguns, quite a few of which are heavily decorated with select woods and ornate engraving.

Most of the guns are exhibited in their own section of the museum and the exhibit is impressive. The guns are displayed in well-lit cabinets mounted to give excellent views of the weapons. The signage is informative and easy

to read. The firearms exhibits are well organized by type and arranged chronologically so you can get an overall idea of the progress in firearms development at the Husqvarna factory.

In addition to the static displays of firearms in cabinets, much of the machinery used to make the guns is also on display. These range from early water-powered machinery to more modern electric powered machinery used during the 20th century. Among the machines are fascinating devices for fabricating, and rifling the barrels of double rifles, as well as polishing double rifle and shotgun barrels.

The weapons part of the museum also includes dioramas of skilled gun makers who hand fitted Husqvarna's top of the line double rifles and shotguns. The dioramas show the workers, including master gun smiths, at their stations, with all their tools. The signage explaining what they are doing is outstanding and provides deep insight into the art of making fine guns before the days of CAD/CAM and CNC machines. These men were master artisans who spent years as apprentices learning their trade and honing their gunsmithing skills.



In addition to the firearms sections, the full range of Husqvarna's other products are on display. If you are a motorcycle or bicycle enthusiast you will not be disappointed as the museum exhibits show at least one of every model that Husqvarna produced. The motorcycles on display include several that won famous motorcycle races with the signage providing the history of that particular machine and the men who rode it. There are large exhibits of Husqvarna's sewing machines, stoves and appliances, chainsaws and outdoors products, making

the museum more than just a gun museum – it is an industrial museum. The photo is just of a small part of the vast motorcycle collection on display. Photo by author.

The museum is operated by the Husqvarna Local History Society and comprises more than 2,400 square meters of display space on two floors. It is located in the city of Husqvarna, near the southern end of beautiful Lake Vattern, next to the Husqvarna waterfall. The staff is friendly and very helpful. I had an extensive conversation with the museum director about Swedish Rolling Blocks and Mausers. When he found out I was a collector he personally pointed out some of the more historically significant items on display. It is usually open seven days a week and admission is 700 SEK (\$1 = 9.5 kroner) for adults and 500 kroner for seniors. Groups can book private guided tours for an additional fee. There is a gift shop and small cafe. The museum staff will do contract research on specific items for a fee.
