

♦ April 23rd Meeting on The Finest in Firearms: Bob Hart, provided an exceptional presentation on a somewhat eclectic subject of single shot, bull's-eye (target) pistols. Bob has been a VGCA member for many years now, and has been collecting this genre of fine single shot pistols for more than 30 years. His presentation covered single shot cartridge pistols from the 1860's to the present, and included both European and American, pre and post WWII, and plinker/parlor/target examples.

Early American single shot pistols discussed included the Frank Wesson bicycle and target model pistols, Stevens model #43 parlor, model #35 medium frame, and the Stevens Lord target pistol

(as used by Annie Oakley), the S&W Perfect single shot series of pistols, and the Remington series of rolling block single shot pistols. Early European single shot pistols, were largely manufactured in Belgium and Germany by various modestly sized manufactures, and tended to be very elaborate, sometimes incorporating double set triggers. These early European pistols were typically designed for use in indoor parlor/beer hall, or at a target range,

and seldom used for lowly plinking activities such as was enjoyed by many American shooters.

In the 1920's and 30's, several American manufacturers, such as Remington (RB Mdl. 1902), Harrington & Richardson (Model USRA), Colt (Camp Perry Model) and S&W (Straight Line) free single shot target pistols were produced for a somewhat limited specialty market, including Olympic competition.

Generally, American single shot free pistols tended to mimic the grips of US military service revolvers, or the Colt Model 1911 semiautomatic pistol with a locked wrist grip. Europeans, on the other hand tended to prefer to design their free pistols for a relaxed wrist grip.

Post WWII American pistols included such memorable examples such as the Wamo Power Master,



Sheridan Knockabout, Savage Model 101 (SAA mimic) and the Tompkins pistols. Post WWII free pistol competition was dominated by the fine Hammerli Model 100 Olympic, the ugly, but finely functional Russian TOZ 35, and some excellent Italian pistols. Americans developed the High Standard and Green free pistols that utilized electric trigger mechanisms, but their production numbers were extremely low and as such they are rarely encountered. Bob's presentation was exceptionally interesting and covered an area of collecting that is seldom experienced by most collectors. We wish to thank Bob for sharing his awesome collection and his vast knowledge on this subject.

Business Meeting of April 23, 2015: Acting President Jim Burgess brought the meeting to order. Jim called all guests to introduce themselves of which we had three. Membership Chairman Larry Hare announced there was one new prospective member present to be voted on. Tor Johnson was voted into the club, sponsored by Richard Pripeton. Shannon gave a treasurers report. We had a good show, 1,500 people through the door. We can attribute this largely to road signs, fliers and the internet. We made more than we spent overall, and we are in a better place financially than where we were last year. Surveys showed there was general happiness with our show, and there were some good suggestions the board will be following up on.

We sponsored a table at the NRA Convention in Nashville, TN. One of the guns at the table won a silver medallion which they present to ten unique arms at the convention. By winning the silver medallion for sponsoring the table we received another gold star to add on our plaque. The other gold stars we received in the years 2000, 2001, 2004, and 2014. Meeting next year will be in Louisville, KY.

Member 2 showed a Webley single-shot pistol with a box, and original markings. You can open the handle up and add weights. It was chambered in .22 caliber long-rifle.

Member 3 presented his recently acquired Russian Type 91 Mosin Nagant Genuine Sniper Rifle complete with matching scope and mount.

Member 4 presented his recently acquired Swedish Model 67/84 Rolling Block military rifle in 8x58 Danish, complete with original spike bayonet. In addition, he presented numerous single shot European target pistols, including a Hammerli Model

100 Olympic, Russian Model TOZ-35, Czech Bruno PAV break barrel entry level target pistol, a Webley & Scott Service pistol with the Parker Hale .22 conversion unit, a Webley & Scott Mdl 1911 London Metropolitan Police .22 training pistol, and a Webley & Scott Mdl 1909 break barrel target pistol.
