# October 2008 VGCA e-Newsletter – Gun Show Issue

The VGCA e-Newsletter: To keep down the costs of first class mailings, the VGCA Newletter is limited to 4 pages on 2 sheet of paper. This results in limiting the number of photos and other content forwarded by members requesting information from the combined club membership about specific problems, firearms variants, or related items. For the last few issues there have been two versions of the Newsletter, a mail version and an expanded email version, the VGCA e-Newsletter. Soon, there will be changes to the mail version and the Newsletter will be printed in black and white. The email version will continue to be in color and will be PDF formatted to minimize the size of the document for those with dial-up email. This allows significant savings in printing and mailing, especially if mailed item is returned for a bad address. To start, or ensure continued receipt of the e-Newsletter, please update your email information with Larry Hare, ASAP. Those without email or internet access may want to ask neighbors or children to download the e-Newsletter off our webpage at http://www.vgca.org/. Alternately, the VGCA webpage can be accessed at your local library. Minimizing newsletter costs will help the Club, and the membership on email distribution will benefit by receiving an unabridged, color version of the *e*-Newsletter.



Presentation at the August 28<sup>th</sup> Meeting: After initial announcements, Doug Wickland of the NRA National Firearms Museum introduced the guest speaker in the first on this year's NRA/National Firearms Museum (NFM) VGCA Presentation Series, Mr. Stuart C. Mowbray (photo left), the Editor of the *Man at Arms* magazine and owner of Mowbray Publishing. Over the last 30 years, Mr. Mowbray has had over 100 books in print. The presentation was dedicated to gun collecting but did not involve any specific firearm or weapon. Instead it was one of the most interesting and potentially valuable sessions a collector could ever hear – tips for collectors or how to preserve a collection. It included museum techniques and practices, such as the "white glove" treatment or using gloves while handling to minimize corrosive oils from your skin which can rust a firearm or fine blade. It included cleaning techniques and what NOT to do, including overcleaning, how to remove rust without damaging finish, and finally using preservatives. It also has a detailed explanation of what preservatives will do and also what they cannot do. He explained how even a well oiled gun can rust when dust is able to serve as a conduit for moisture through the protective oil. He covered the usage of microcrystalline versus organic waxes and how oil and wax do NOT mix. He cautioned about leather treatments and preservatives and how they may actually hasten damage due to bacteria. It was a very informative night

and generated extensive questions. He concluded with the most valuable advice cautioning about getting too paranoid and recommended that a program of care done regularly is better than a perfect program done rarely. Mr. Mowbray had signed copies of his book, 331+ Essential Tips and Tricks – A How-to Guide for the Gun Collector available for sale.

▶ Presentation for the October 23<sup>rd</sup> Meeting: The joint NRA/NFM and VGCA presentation will be the new director of the National Firearms Museum – Jim Supica. Jim will no doubt talk about the future plans of the museum and, hopefully Smith and Wessons, as he was the co-author, along with Rick Nahas, of the <u>Standard</u> <u>Catalog of Smith & Wesson, 3rd Edition</u>, one of the definitive tomes on Smith and Wesson firearms. Members may bring their S&W questions or firearms for show and tell and discuss them with Jim. The November / December meeting will be held **December 4** and feature the 3<sup>rd</sup> NRA/NFM presentation.

**August 28<sup>th</sup> Business Meeting: Addison Hurst** chaired the meeting. Prior to the presentation, it was announced that Phil Schrierer, Senior Curator of the NRA/NFM was working in Raton, NM to set up the National Firearms Museum Annex on the Old West. After the presentation and short break, **Larry Hare**, Membership reported that there were no new VGCA membership applications pending. **Rick Nahas** announced that the show would have 14 display tables, and he had only 10 vacant tables available. **Ed Costello** provided a Treasurer's report on Club expenses and income. **Kelly Cook** introduced his guest, Andy Dotson.


**August Show and Tell:** The S&T was kicked off by **Addison Hurst** who wrestled out his M82A1 Barrett Light Fifty, a semi-automatic long range rifle firing the .50 Browning heavy machinegun round. This rifle has achieved a stellar reputation in the Global War on Terror in Iraq and Afghanistan against a variety of targets – NOT your casual plinker. **Sonny Laine** explained his new 1898 Krag Carbine in a 1901 stock that he recently obtained from a very limited release by the CMP. The carbine, although not in a standard configuration, was modified for use of the M3 blanks. Another **member** displayed a very rare Short Magazine Lee Enfield SMLE No.1MkV Trials Rifle. This rifle was one of 24,000 built between 1922-24 and featured a receiver mounted rear peep sight, a concept later adopted for improved WW2 era No.4Mk1. **Ernie Lyles** presented his 1909 Steyr automatic pistol in .25 ACP with a tip up barrel. These pistols had a long run with manufacture ceasing in 1939. He also had a .22LR loading block marked Parker Whelan, Washington, DC. **Bill Chronister** showed 2 recent acquisitions, a 1896 Swedish Mauser in near perfect condition, and a Tennessee Valley Muzzleloading (TVM) semi-custom Southern Virginia school 'Poorboy' flintlock in .50 caliber. **Larry Hare** brought his CZ241 16 gauge automatic shotgun made in 1947 in Czechoslovakia, and a Schwarzlos German "blow-forward" action pistol in .32 ACP. A **member** showed military script from Afghanistan and a selection of S&W military revolvers consisting of a .38 Special, an Australian-

**Zimmerman** displayed William B. Harrison's Revolutionary War sword. No, NOT the President, but a Virginian from the Leesburg area. This was a very well preserved example with wonderful provenance. **John Morris** surprised the crowd with an under-200 pound weapon, a pocketable Walther PP pistol in .380. He then went on to caution the audience how he had a discharge from the pistol when it was dropped without the safety engaged. Take heed. **John Babey** presented his pocket Navy Conversion chambered for .38 rimfire. These revolvers were converted between 1875-1880 from the older, obsolete cap and ball design to use modern cased ammunition and use old stock. **Roger Sherman** closed the session with an update on his Mannlicher-Schoenauer Model 1956-MC Carbine marked .244 Remington (6mm Remington). This is one of the rarest variations of this firearm. It now sports a wonderful 1.7-10X42mm Swarovski illuminated reticle scope cradled in a new Griffin and Howe dual lever, quick release sidemount installed by Griffin and Howe, who also added custom 22 LPI checkering to the stock.

From hearing the comments of attendees, they were very well received, however one comment stood out when a husband and wife made a point about this is what gun collecting is all about. To the awards...

## 1st Place: Marc Gorelick & Addison Hurst - U.S. Magazine Rifles and Carbines, Caliber .30

This comprehensive review of the US Service rifles known as Krags ranged from the first 1892 model to one of the last Krags cartouched in 1903, the year the M1903 Springfield was adopted. The display included .22 trainers, accourrements, original ammunition, manuals and documentation. Congratulations!

# 2<sup>nd</sup> Place: Dan Szatkowski - Webley Pistols

Though small in size, this display was rich in variety. It was a very comprehensive display of British Webley pistols and revolvers, including some extremely unusual and rare variations, especially here in the United States where they were never marketed. Thanks for the history.

# 3<sup>rd</sup> Place: Jim Vaughn - The Arms of Morgan's Raiders

Jim, from the Potomac Arms Collectors, put together this well regarded Civil War display of an overview of the types of rifles, pistols and edged weapons that were used by Morgan's Raiders in the U.S. Civil War. Well done!

# Judges' Choice: Ernie Lyles - It Does What?

If you attend the monthly meetings and have ever seen Ernie Lyles tell of his esoteric arms like automatic revolvers, triangular or rocket-propelled bullets from space guns and other unique action firing mechanisms, this was your display. To see these obscure rarities in one place was a real treat.




