## October Presentation



Our October presentation was on the **Finnish Mosin-Nagant Rifles** by member Matt DiRisio. Matt is a relatively new member of the VGCA and has been collecting Finnish Mosin-Nagants for several years. His knowledge and expertise on the topic was impressive!

Matt opened with a brief of summary of Finnish combat operations during the WW2 period. It started when the Soviet Union invaded Finland in November 1939 and what became known as the "Winter War" continued through brutally cold winter conditions until April 1940. Despite tremendous disadvantages in personnel and heavy equipment, the Finns managed to fight the Russian invaders to a standstill. From June 1941 until September 1944, Finland fought alongside Germany against the USSR and recovered the land lost to the Soviets during the Winter War. This period became known as the "Continuation War." As the tide turned against Nazi Germany, the Finns signed an Armistice with the USSR, and from September 1944 until April 1945 they fought with the Russians against the Germans.

Throughout this period, the primary battle rifle of the Finnish forces was one variant or another of the Mosin-Nagant Model 1891 rifle. Indeed, the Mosin-Nagant served Finland from the time of Finland's Independence in 1918 through to the 1980s. Truth be told, however, Finland was not a rich nation and fielded just about any weapons they could get their hands on! The M1891, chambered in 7.62x54r, was chosen primarily because Imperial Russian forces left several hundred thousand rifles behind after Finland declared its independence.



Matt provided superb background on the different models of Finnish Mosin-Nagant rifles, drawing on his own extensive collection to illustrate various details (above)

RIFLE	NOTES	
M91	Made by and for Imperial Russia by no less than seven different factories in 3 countries. Original Finnish issued M91s had a stock disc noting the unit to which that the rifle was issued. These were later ordered to be removed to avoid providing intelligence data in the event the rifle was captured.	
M24	Made for the Finnish Civil Guard. The Civil Guard was described as "similar t the Boy Scouts, the National Guard, and the National Rifle Association all rolled into a single organization." The Civil Guard and the Finnish Army did not alway see "eye-to-eye" and frequently fielded different weapons.	
M27	Made for the Finnish Army by Tikka and Valmet. Initially noted for poorly designed nose cap that could cause the stock to splinter if fired with the bayonet mounted. A later M27 cap with reinforcing 'popsicle sticks' was retrofitted.	
M28	An improved M27 made for the Civil Guard and utilizing barrels made in Germany and by SIG in Switzerland. The M28s were assembled by a new factory called "Sujeluskuntien Ase-Ja Konepaja Osakeyhtio." This translates to "Arms and Engineering workshop of the Civil Guard". Today it is better known by its initials SAKO!	
M28/30	Also made for the Civil Guard, this improved version of the M28 incorporated adjustable front sights and was used to win the world shooting championship.	
M39	Developed to provide one rifle to be used by both the Finnish Army and the Civil Guard. Adopted just as the Soviets invaded in 1939, only 12 had been built when the Winter War started. By 1944, half of all rifles fielded by the Finns were M39s	
M30	Made from captured Russian Mosin-Nagant Model 91/30s.	
M28/76	This Cold War adaptation of the M28/30 included a half stock and diopter sights. Some M28/76s also had scope bases.	
TKIV 85	This sniper/designated marksman variant of the venerable Mosin-Nagant is still in use by the Finnish Defense Forces today. Valmet provided new barrels in 7.62x53r (a caliber unique to the Finns, bullet diameter is .309 compared to the standard .311/.312 of 7.62x54r ammunition) and the TKIV 85s were assembled in 1984-85.	



Stock discs were ordered removed to avoid compromising their assigned unit, thus only 1-3% are estimated to survive. Shown is one of those scarce M91 stock discs (above left). Matt explains the details of an M39 (above right).

Additional notes on Mosin-Nagant markings:

- The magazines on some M28/30s and M39s are marked with an "HV." This designates that the magazines were modified to improve feeding
- Serial Numbers where should they be found?
  - o Russian M-Ns will be numbered on the bolt, barrel, magazine floor place and butt plate
  - Finnish M-Ns will be numbered on the barrel and bolt. Exceptions include some M39s (last four of the s/n on the magazine floor plate) and some M28/30s (last two digits of the s/n on the butt plate). The term 'Finn matched' denoted matching barrel and bolt.



Matt shared various Finnish accessories, to include oilers (above left) and bayonets (above right). Matt noted that some accessories are far more scarce than the rifles themselves. For example, 100,000 M39 rifles were built but only 10,000 bayonets for the M39 were made.

Matt provided an outstanding presentation that was enjoyed by all present. Thank you Matt!

♥ October Business: Vice President Wes Chappell (*at right*) called the August meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Former President Ernie Lyles led us through the U.S. Pledge of Allegiance, which was followed by a moment of silence to remember those serving in harm's way. There were 54 VGCA members and guests in attendance. The guests were introduced to the membership by their sponsors/hosts.



Wes provided an update on our November gun show – stating that our show was sold out and that there was a waiting list for tables. Set up is on Friday, November  $2^{nd}$  and we need volunteers (preferably with strong backs!) to help set up tables, etc.

Security director Steve Gomes also made a pitch for volunteers, saying that there were slots available on both days of the show.

Jim Ashing's (a first time exhibitor!) display of the Transition of Colt Revolvers from New Pocket to Pocket Positive models was truly exceptional and earned a well-deserved 1<sup>st</sup> Place in the judging!



Jim's display included a computer screen that cycled through a presentation explaining the features and significance of each piece as well as hard copies of support documentation (above left). This display also included an impressive collection of Colt shop tools and gauges (above right).



Rob Becker's display "Flare Pistols and Signal Projectors of WW2" covered an unusual subject and included flare guns from five separate nations (United States, England, Germany, Japan, and the U.S.S.R.). This display earned 2<sup>nd</sup> Place in the judging!



Karl Karash undoubtedly displayed some of the rarest specimens at the show. His exhibit title of "Where have all the Rare 1911s gone?" definitely answered its own question! Included were three examples of Singer M1911A1s (out of a production run of only 500 pistols) as well as three examples of the even more rare North American Arms M1911 (total production ~100 following the cancelation of their WW1 contract). This exceptional gathering of rare and valuable pieces was a definite treat to those who got to see them and earned 3<sup>rd</sup> Place!



Shannon Zeigler's display of Commonwealth Aperture Backsights shared some of the "tools of the trade" of shooting Lee-Enfield service rifles in competition five plus decades ago. The precision engineering and manufacturing that went into these target sights (and other accessories) is very impressive!



A detail view (at left) of some of Shannon's target aperture sights, original boxes/cases, front sight adjustment tools, etc. The display judges recognized the effort that went into gathering the pieces of this unique display and presented a well-earned "Judge's Choice Award" to Mr. Zeigler!

Roy Anderson is VGCA member who displayed for the first time at our November gun show. His exhibit was on the U.S. Model 1905 Bayonet (at right). The Model 1905 bayonet was adopted shortly after the Model 1903 Springfield rifle was fielded by the U.S. Army, replacing the less-than-successful ramrod bayonet of the initial M1903 rifles. Roy's display covered all aspects of the bayonet that served the U.S. military on M1903 and M1 Garands for almost 40 years, including many seldom-seen varaints – and some of the even more scarce scabbards!





Mike Alsop's display of Early Remington Shotguns (at left) included an impressive selection of both single and double-barrel examples dating as far back as the 1860s. It included a single shot rolling block shotgun (I never knew Remington made such a thing!) and the first hammerless Remington shotgun (the Model 1894).



Gary Latta (another first-time exhibitor) provided a more modern collecting perspective with his "The Evolution of Glock Perfection" display (above). It covered all generations of this contemporary classic, as well as rarely encountered training pistols. Note red pistol at the upper right. It is one of only two known red live pistols made for the Stembridge Movie Rental Company (red Glocks, such as the two at the lower left are typically non-functioning police/security trainers)



Last but certainly not least was Mark Tatum's "Life in the Trenches – A Timely Display of WWI Firearms and Equipment." Timely indeed, in this 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the end of "the War to End All Wars." In addition to firearms, this display included rarely encountered equipment such as trench maces and periscopes!

It is worth noting that Jim Ashing, Roy Anderson, and Gary Latta were first time exhibitors. The VGCA Executive Committee, in an effort to encourage our newer members to display their collections, has established a \$100 stipend to help first time displayers defray the costs of setting up an educational display. ## STOLEN MACHINE GUN PARTS KITS

## **CMP UPDATE – 2019/2020 CMP SCHOLARSHIPS**

Not many know it but the Civilian Marksmanship Program (CMP) has an annual scholarship program in which it awards \$1,000 scholarships to exemplary student-athletes. The scholarships are based on merit and rifle or pistol marksmanship participation and are open only to current high school seniors. Since 2005, the CMP has awarded over \$1 million dollars in scholar money and winning recipients came from a mix of JROTC, 4-H groups and other shooting clubs.

The CMP is dedicated to supporting youth programs and furthering the education of the young adults associated with them. Through these scholarships, the CMP is able to fulfill one of its missions of rewarding those who demonstrate exceptional talent, motivation and determination in the field of marksmanship. Scholarships may be used to pursue education or vocational programs for the upcoming school year.

To be considered for a scholarship, applicants must submit a list of past and present rifle and/or pistol competition history, awards, involvements and future expectations for the sport. Proof of participation must be submitted. These include match bulletins, photos or CMP Competition Tracker printouts. Applicants must also submit academic records showing that they have a 3.0 Grade Point Average (GPA) or higher, as well as an official transcript. (Anyone with a less than 3.0 GPA will not be considered.) In addition, applicants must submit a letter explaining why he or she is applying and what future plans the scholarship money will fund. Finally, a nomination/recommendation letter from a coach or instructor is required.

According to the CMP, incomplete applications will not be considered and all required forms and documents must be sent together. The deadline for submissions is March 20, 2019. If you know a young man or women who you think may qualify, inform them of this opportunity. # Show-n-Tell

NOTE: Anyone bringing in items for Show-n-Tell, please hold them up so the members can see it. Member 1 brought in a Finnish Sako P46 (*at left*). This single shot bolt action is a commercial sporting rifle chambered in .22 LR. The P46 model was manufactured from 1947 to ~1952. Only about 9500 were made, so this rifle is fairly uncommon. It is well built and features a birch hardwood stock.



In keeping with the night's presentation topic, Member 2 shared his Finnish Mosin-Nagant M-24 Civil Guard Rifle (*above left*). As Matt pointed out, the M24 (sometimes referred to as the 91/24) was also known as the "*Lotta*" Rifle. The "*Lotta*" name came from the Civil Guard's woman's volunteer service, the *Lotta Svard*. This group helped raise money to pay for the rifles by holding events and bake sales. The *Lotta Svard* was organized in 1918. By 1944 it had 242,000 members and was the largest women's' auxiliary in the world.

When the Finnish Civil Guard rebarreled their M1891 rifles, they obtained barrels from Schweiz Industrie Gesellschaft (SIG) in Switzerland, and two companies in Germany. German barrels were marked "*Bohler Stahl.*" Swiss barrels were marked "*Schweiz Industrie Gesellschaft.*" To meet Civil Guard accuracy requirements, the barrels were heavier than standard Russian barrels. Some of the later heavy barrels were stepped on the end to allow fitting the Russian bayonet. Total production of the M24 was 26,000 (8000 with SIG barrels, less than 3,000 had SIG straight barrels) made between 1924 and 1926. This example started a Remington Model 1891 Russian Contract. This rifle is all original Remington, with exception of the Swiss SIG straight barrel and sight modifications.

Member 2 also shared a Finnish muzzle cap/cleaning rod guide for the M24 and a bayonet for the Finnish M28 (*above right*).



Member 3 brought a Finnish Mosin-Nagant – this one a M27 (*above*). Made for the Finnish Defense Forces (as opposed to the Civil Guard), the M27 is sometimes referred to as the "Make Do" Rifle. The M27s started as M1891s that were modified with new stocks consisting of two pieces of native arctic birch spliced together, resulting in less warpage. They were also given new barrels (this barrel was made by Tikka) and rear sights calibrated in meters instead of the archaic Imperial Russian standard unit of measurement of arshins. This example was "made" (modified may be a better descriptor) in 1934 and has the "popsicle stick" extensions to the nose cap – a redesign that solved the problem of the stocks breaking when used with the bayonet.

Member 3 also shared an Italian Carcano-Mannlicher Model 1938 rifle (*not pictured*). This bolt action is chambered in 7.35x51, which was not made in sufficient numbers to reequip the Italian military prior to the start of WW2. Therefore the M1938 was "surplused" when Italy decided to revert to standardize on the 6.5x52 Carcano caliber. As a result, 94,500 Model 1938s and 50 million rounds of ammunition were sold to Finland in 1940 and 1941. Nicknamed the "Terni" by the Finns (after the Italian factory that produced most of the rifles), it was not popular in that country due to its non-standard caliber and mediocre accuracy (not helped by a fixed rear battle sight set for 200m). In Finnish service, the M1938 was mainly used by rear echelon troops. The example was marked "SA" in a box, indicating it was one of those M1938s that was sold to Finland. The boxed SA for Suomen Armeija (Finnish Amy), was the Finnish Army property mark.

Member 4 is seeking the memberships help in identifying a mystery "ZF39" scope (*not pictured*). It is a German scope manufactured during WW2 by O.G. Sherrel. It is also marked "DK GERARD, Charlottenburg." If anyone can shed some light on this scope, please contact member Dave Litchfield.



Member 5 presented a very nice Remington M1891 and bayonet (*above*). Remington was one of the companies contracted by Russia to make M1891s during WW1 and went on to produce 1,500,000 examples during 1915-1917. This example has an early serial number (making it over 100 years old) and was probably delivered before the Russian Revolution in 1917. It ended up in Finnish hands and its condition suggests it did not see field use.



Member 6 shared several items, including a Savage 99, a Colt Lightning revolver, a Martini Henry action, and an H&K USP Compact 45 pistol (*the latter three pictured above*). The Savage Model 99 was perhaps the finest hunting lever action ever made. This very nice example is chambered in .300 Savage, has a 5-round rotary magazine with a round counter and was made in 1946.

The Lightning was Colt's first double-action revolver. This one was made in 1880 and will shoot .38 Short and .38 Long Colt.

The Martini-Henry action is a large frame short lever model and was originally made for R.B. Rodda Outfitters. Member 6 intends to resurrect it as a 10 or 12 gauge shotgun.

Finally, Member 6 presented his Heckler & Koch USP pistol chambered in .45 ACP. It was made in Germany in the 1980s or 1990s – and points very naturally!



Member 7 brought in a rather unusual revolver made by Merwin, Hulbert & Company (*above*). Merwin, Hulbert & Co. were based in New York City and produced revolvers and rifles from 1876 to 1916. This particular single action revolver is a Pocket Army  $-2^{nd}$  Model. It is in .44/40 Winchester Center Fire caliber and was one of less than 20,000 manufactures between ~1880 and 1890. The Pocket Army was an open top design and 3 ½ inch or 7 inch barrels were available. Because of its design, the barrels were easily swapped out and the savvy pistolero of the late 19<sup>th</sup> century could convert his handgun back and forth to suit his needs. It also featured a "birds head" grip with a protruding "skull-crusher" at the bottom of the frame. Merwin-Hulberts had a reputation for quality design and manufacturing and were considered by many at the time as the finest revolver available (to include Jesse James and Pat Garrett). This piece was made in about 1881, though it hard to say for certain as factory records were lost in a fire.



Member 8 shared his Springfield Model 1864 .58 caliber rifle (*above*) and bayonet. This is last model of muzzle-loader made at the Springfield Armory and was only in production for about one year. This example is in excellent condition and belongs to Member 8's father.



Member 9 concluded our October Show-n-Tell by showing us his Finnish M39. What makes this rifle particularly collectible is that is marked with "SK.Y" an abbreviation for Suojeluskuntain Yliesikunta (Civil Guard) indicating ownership and use by the Civil Guard. Though the M39 was designed to provide a single rifle for both the Army and the Civil Guard, most went to the former. This gun was purchased about a year ago from a "walk-in" at the Chantilly Gun Show. Member 9 got a good deal on the rifle and a couple of months later found an equally good deal on a crate of 7.62x54r ammunition!

## A TRIP TO THE MUSEUM: KUNGSHOLMS FORT

Kungsholms Fort is a large, naval fortress off the west coast of the island Tjurkö, around 5 kilometers south of Karlskrona in southern Sweden. Construction started in 1680 on the orders of Sweden's King Karl XI to protect the town of Karlskrona. Located at the southern entrance of the Blekinge archipelago, it, and the Drottningskär Castle fortress on the neighboring island of Aspö, would guard the main channel to Sweden's newest naval base. Throughout the years Kungsholms's artillery and defenses were modernized and strengthened and the fortress was a linchpin of Sweden's coastal defenses during the cold war. Kungsholms Fort is still owned by the Swedish Navy, which conducts specialist training there, and it is thus the longest continuously used military installation in the world as well as being a World Heritage site. The fortress is only accessible to the public by special boat and guided tours.

The fortress itself is one huge artillery museum and although most of the heavy ordnance has been removed the gun emplacements are impressive. And one can clamber over the walls and bastions. The most famous building of the fort is probably the remarkable circular harbor which was built so the fort could be safely resupplied during sieges. Also of interest is the mighty three-story cannon tower, once the central defense installation of the fort. On the top floor of the tower is a hidden museum that contains numerous coast artillery range finders, ship detection apparatus, artillery aiming devices, loading equipment, and related artillery equipment. Although many of the devices have signage it is not a museum exhibit in the modern sense but seems rather like a storage room for old equipment - you can walk among the devices and actually handle them.



For gun collectors, the small fortress museum, which tells the story of the fort and coastal artillery, is a hidden and pleasant surprise full of machine guns, including many different models of Nordenfelt guns. In fact, it almost seems like a Nordenfelt museum. The Nordenfelt was a popular piece of ordnance in the Swedish navy. Like the top floor of the artillery tower, it is not a living museum in the modern sense, but is rather a static museum that has not been updated. Most of the guns, other ordnance, and related equipment are right out there on the floor to walk among and touch.

The Nordenfelt gun was a multiple barrel organ gun that had a row of from two to twelve barrels. It was designed by a Swedish engineer, Helge Palmcrantz, who patented in 1873 a mechanism to load and fire a multiple barreled gun. Production of the weapon was funded by a Swedish steel producer and banker (later weapons maker) named Thorsten Nordenfelt, who was working in London and the gun is named after him.

It was fired by pulling a lever back and forth and ammunition was gravity fed through chutes for each barrel. It was produced in a number of different calibers from rifle caliber up to 1 inch. There were larger caliber Nordenfelts but for them the mechanism simply permitted rapid manual loading rather than automatic fire. The gun was adopted by over 14 countries, including the British Royal Navy. During a demonstration held at Portsmouth a ten-barreled Nordenfelt weapon, firing .45 caliber cartridges fired 3,000 rounds in 3 minutes and 3 seconds without stoppage or failure. When the Maxim machine gun came on the scene it outclassed the Nordenfelt. Thorsten Nordenfelt merged his firm with the Maxim Gun Company in 1888 to become Maxim Nordenfelt Guns and Ammunition Company Limited.

The Nordenfelts in the Kungsholms Fort museum were used on Swedish naval vessels as well as for defense of the fort in case hostile forces attempted to land on the island.

Almost all the signage in the museum is in Swedish and much of the printing is faded making some of the signage difficult to read. The small museum appears to have been put together as an afterthought and stuck in a former bomb shelter. It has the feel of a storage room more than a curated museum and lighting could be better. However, for the military historian or machine gun and artillery enthusiast it is a diamond in the rough. And the tour of the rest of the fortress is fascinating.

Visiting Kungsholms is only possible with a guided tour that is offered regularly from May to September. Tickets must be obtained in advance at the tourist office in Karlskrona's central square. Each participant over 18 years must provide proof of identity; foreigners should show their passports. The fortress island is only accessible by special tour boat, which leaves from Fisktorget in Karlskrona. The boat trip provides interesting a sights of Karlskrona's several harbors, including artillery towers built on small islets. Tours are conducted in Swedish, German and English and parts of the island fortress are off-limits. There are no food

facilities for tourists.

If you are interested in artillery forts, while in Karlskrona you should also visit the restored Drotttningskars Kastell on the island of Aspo, which also guarded the main sea approach to Karlskrona. It is a jewel of a Vauban-style fort that British Royal Navy Admiral Horatio Nelson called impregnable.

What it lacks in small arms displays it makes up for in period cannon. You can take the free car ferry that runs once an hour and departs from Handelshamnen, just north of the Marinmuseum in Karlskrona. Entrance is free and there is a restaurant.
